Club Gin

We are extremely proud to announce that the City University Club Gin was awarded the bronze prize for London Dry Gin in the International Wine and Spirit Competition.



The IWSC is among the world's largest and most influential spirits awards, with over 50 years of experience, and adjudicated by world-renowned judges.

The 2023 Spring issue of The Bugle included an article on the Club Gin but, as a reminder of its background, the gin is produced exclusively for the City University Club by Hawkridge Distillers, based in Newbury, who are known for producing premium British made sprits using organic botanicals sourced locally to Berkshire. The tasting notes describe the gin as having "a warm juniper forward that gives way to a fresh citrus heart and delicate floral notes, all smoothed with honey." The ABV is 40%.

It is available for sale to members by the bottle, priced at £48, and would make an excellent gift. Just ask any of the staff who would be pleased to arrange a bottle for you.

Thanks also to those who were able to attend but, if you were unable to get along, and would like to see the accounts, kindly contact Hasita, who would be happy to send the details to you.




Club Table

Club History – 29th June 1911, when Lord Kitchener's Staff Officers came for lunch.



In this edition we look at a small but fascinating story, which is told in the correspondence displayed in the cabinet located on the stair wall of the club between the bar and the dining room. I admit that, although I had seen these letters over the years, in the Smoking Room at 50 Cornhill, and now at Crutched Friars, I had not properly taken the time to read them until recently, when they were drawn to my attention by Andrew Gammon, and to whom I'm grateful.

While I have prepared a typescript of the correspondence below, as the originals are not always so easy to read, I will let the letters tell their own tale. In these days of emails and other electronic forms of communication, it is refreshing to see handwritten correspondence, including corrections, crossings out, and some wonderful use of language. More details of several of the personnel involved may be found on the internet, which I think adds more colour and helps bring the

event further to life.

I hope you enjoy reading this article and, if you've not already done so, do look out for the originals when you're next at the club.

4, Great Winchester Street, London, E.C. 15th June 1911

Dear Sir,

On Thursday the 29th inst the King is to lunch with the Lord Mayor at the Guildhall. Lord Kitchener the Chief of the Staff has been invited to the luncheon, but no provision has been made to supply his staff officers with any refreshment.

It has occurred to some members of the club that it would be a gracious and acceptable act if the Committee of the Club were to invite the staff officers to lunch on that day, and I should be much obliged if you would put this as a proposal before the next Committee meeting.

Housekeeping and Regular Reminders
